
Church of the Little Flower is blessed to be able to minister to around 1,100 Catholic families, almost 3,000 parishioners. We serve the southeast corner of Springfield.

Brief History of Little Flower Parish

In 1946, the Bishop of the Diocese of Springfield-in-Illinois notified Reverend Raymond

O'Connor, who was then the Chaplain of St. Joseph's Home for the Aged, to begin to build temporary quarters for the new Church of the Little Flower. In 1947, the "Quonset Church" was erected. This new type of pre-fab building was a result of the limited supply of building materials from the just ended World War II. This "temporary" home for the church lasted until 1963, when construction of the new church was completed.

The most obvious need of the young parish family (during the first twenty years of the parish, 2,300 baptisms were performed, whereas burials were less than 200) was to build a permanent school. The first



The plans and design for the new church were created with input from the parish family that came together in the intimacy of the "Quonset Church." Interestingly, the construction of the new church was finished before Vatican Council II but marked the beginning of bringing people closer to the altar and making participation in the liturgy more personal and meaningful.

The sanctuary ceramic mosaic mural is an artistic presentation of the Good Shepherd



and His flock. Created by artist Robert Harmon, it is composed of over 4,000 pieces of ceramic tile, individually shaped, tinted, fired and made composite. The sheep represent all nations, races and peoples. A lost sheep is draped over the shoulders of Christ.

Harmon also designed the main window of the church devoted to St. Therese, the Little Flower. The glass is from Germany with the primary colors and stains of glass so variegated by fir-

ing, it produces more than a thousand tints and hues. The placement of the window is such that it is seen by worshiper as they are leaving the church. Its placement is purposeful because, according to Father O'Connor, "beauty like grace should reward the searcher."

The First Mass was offered on Sunday, June 30, 1963, the same day as the coronation of His Holiness, Pope Paul VI.



PROTECTION GOD'S CHILDREN

A safe environment protects our children from harm, including sexual abuse and child molestation. It allows them to feel confident and secure in the classroom and at church.

How the Diocese of Springfield Is Responding

The Diocese has instituted several policies towards that goal. These include:

- A code of conduct for employees and volunteers who work with children and youth, is outlined in the Policy Against Sexual Misconduct for Lay Employees and Volunteers. This code makes clear what acceptable behavior is and the standards of conduct regarding sexual abuse and harassment.
- A code of conduct for clergy and religious leaders who work with children and youth, outlined in the Policy Against Sexual Misconduct for Clergy and Religious Personnel. This code makes clear what acceptable behavior is and the standards of conduct regarding sexual abuse and harassment.
- Background checks on all adults who have regular and consistent contact with minors.
- Special training programs for all adults who work with minors, including priests, ministers, educators, church personnel, parents and volunteers. They are briefed on preventing, identifying, responding to and reporting child abuse.

SAINT THERESÉ OF THE CHILD JESUS - OF LISIEUX (LITTLE FLOWER) FEAST DAY OCTOBER 1

From obscurity as a young, idealistic Carmelite, Thérèse of Lisieux has emerged as one of the best-loved saints. Her simplicity attracts us because she puts holiness within our reach.

Thérèse was the daughter of Louis and Zélie Martin. When she was four years old, her pleasant childhood was interrupted by Zélie's untimely death. Then Thérèse's older sister, Pauline, took responsibility for raising her in the faith. In 1882, Pauline entered the Carmelite convent at Lisieux, igniting a desire in Thérèse to do the same. Thérèse's fourteenth year was pivotal. Her sister, Mary, joined Pauline at the convent. And at Christmas, the young saint had an experience she described as her "conversion." Later, in A Story of a Soul, her autobiography, Thérèse described it as a release from depression and oversensitivity: "Jesus flooded the darkness of my soul with torrents of light. I got back for good the strength of soul lost when I was four and a half.



Love filled my heart, I forgot myself, and henceforth I was happy." In spite of Thérèse's youth, the next year the bishop allowed her to become a Carmelite at Lisieux.

From childhood Thérèse aspired to become a missionary and a martyr. It soon became clear to her, however, that neither option was open to a cloistered nun. So she sought the Holy Spirit and searched the Scripture for another way to excel:

We live in an age of inventions. We need no longer climb laboriously up flights of stairs. And I am determined to find an elevator to carry me to Jesus, for I was too small to climb the steep stairs of perfection. So I sought in Holy Scripture some idea of what this lift I wanted would be, and I read, "Whoever is a little one, let him come to me" (see Luke 8:16). I also wanted to know how God would deal with a "little one," so I searched and found: "You shall be carried in her arms and fondled in her lap; as a mother comforts her son. . . "(Isaiah 66:12–13 NAB) It is your arms, Jesus, which are the elevator to carry me to heaven. So there is no need for me to grow up. In fact: just the opposite: I must become less and less.

In 1897, Thérèse thought her dream of becoming a missionary was about to come true. The Carmelites at Hanoi in Indochina, now Vietnam, had invited her to join them. But on the early morning of Good Friday she began to hemorrhage from the mouth. She had contracted tuberculosis, which tortured her for several months before it took her life on September 30, 1897. BAPTISM

Infant Baptisms

Parents of children are required to attend a Baptism Class prior to setting a date for the baptism of their child and contact the parish office at least three months prior to the Baptism of their child. Our Baptism Prep Classes are held every two months.

We encourage parents and godparents to attend the class BEFORE your child is born. These classes are offered every two months. If you have attended a Baptism class at Church of the Little Flower within the last 3 years, this requirement is waived.

We also require that the parents and godparents be living their faith, coming to Mass regularly, etc. Further we ask that the parents and godparents participate in a Baptismal class which teaches about their responsibilities for raising their child in the Catholic faith.

Other Requirements:

When a child or an adult is to be baptized, he or she must have at least one godparent. It is customary for children to have two godparents. When there are two, one must be male and the other female.

At Least One Godparent must:

- (a) Be Catholic
- (b) Have been baptized, confirmed and have received First Communion
- (c) Be 16 or older
- (d) Be an active, registered member of a Roman Catholic parish

This means that they must be practicing the faith. In general, if a potential sponsor is not a member of the parish where the baptism is to

take place, he or she must obtain a letter or certificate from their own parish which affirms that they meet the above requirements.

The role of the godparent is to assist the parents and the child in living a Catholic life. In order to do so, the sponsor needs to provide good example of living that life. The role of godparent is a role of service done in the name of the Church, and the person who is a sponsor should be capable of performing that service.

If there is one godparent, the appointment of one 'Christian witness' to the baptism ceremony is allowed. This witness must be a baptized, practicing Christian.

BAPTISM

Children Baptisms for Ages 7 through 14:

We request that both the parents and the children to be Baptized participate together in the Children's Catechumenate (RCIA adapted for children) process for un-baptized children of ages 7 through 14. Please contact the Coordinator of Faith Formation at the parish office for further information. Age 7 is considered the age of reason and after age 14 is old enough for them to attend the adult RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults).

Baptism, the Eucharist, and the sacrament of Confirmation together constitute the "sacraments of Christian initiation, whose unity must be safeguarded. It must be explained to the faithful that the reception of the sacrament of Confirmation is necessary for the completion of baptismal grace.

Penance and Reconciliation




